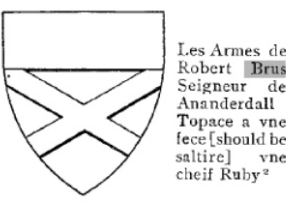
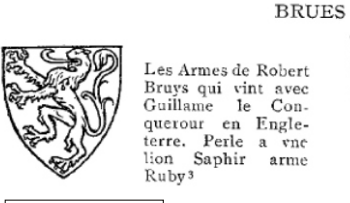

Defuncto Petro de Bruys tertio sine liberis successerunt ei quatuor sorores suae Scilicet Agnes, Lucia, Margareta, et Ladrina, inter quas hereditas diuisa fuit hoc modo. Agnes quam duxerat Walterus Fauconbruge dominus de Rise in Holdernes habuit pro parte sua Castra de Skelton, Mersk, Vpilon, scilicet Swesky (Westly) et Esbourn. Lucia secunda soror quam duxerat Marmaducus Thwenge habuit partem suam Danby, Brotton et Leikburā (Kyrburn) Margareta tertia soror quam duxerat Robertus le Roos dominus Castri de Werck habuit partem suam totam Kendale. Ladrina quarta soror quam duxerat Iohannes de Bellew habuit partem suam Carleton, Kamesford (Kamelsford). Thorp des arches. Thybthorp et certas bouatas terrae in Southburn (Southburton).

Robertus Bruys qui venit in Angliam cum Willelmo Conquestore

Robertus Bruys, 1st Lord of Annandale (c.1070 - 1142) - so a generation later than the Conquest! Agnes was daughter and heiress of Fulk de Paynel of Carleton, North Yorkshire - Burke (1883) p. 80

Adam de Bruys filius primogenitus Adam de Bruys Petrus de Bruys primus

Adam only survived his father by 12 months, having married Jueta, daughter and heiress of William de Arches. She outlived her husband by decades, dying just after 1202 Farrer, William, D.Lit., editor, Early Yorkshire Charters, vol.II, Edinburgh 1915, p.12. Peter's sister Isabel had as second husband Sir Roger Mauduit, their son Robert taking his mother's name of Brus. (see The Percy Charulary, M.T. Martin, Surtees Soc. 117, 1909, 33 No. 57) [Isabel was buried c. 1230 at Whitby Abbey.]

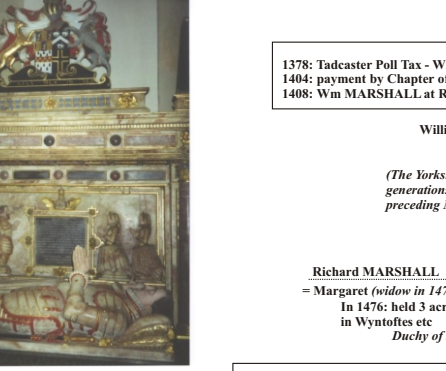
G(u)isborough Priory was founded as the Priory of St Mary by Robert de Brus in 1119 It is just 35 miles by road from Guisborough to Pickering - 25 as the crow flies.

Elizabeth DYON lies beside her second husband Sir John ROPER, 1st Baron Teynham, in the church of St Peter & St Paul, Lynton in Kent She was buried there on September 22nd 1593.

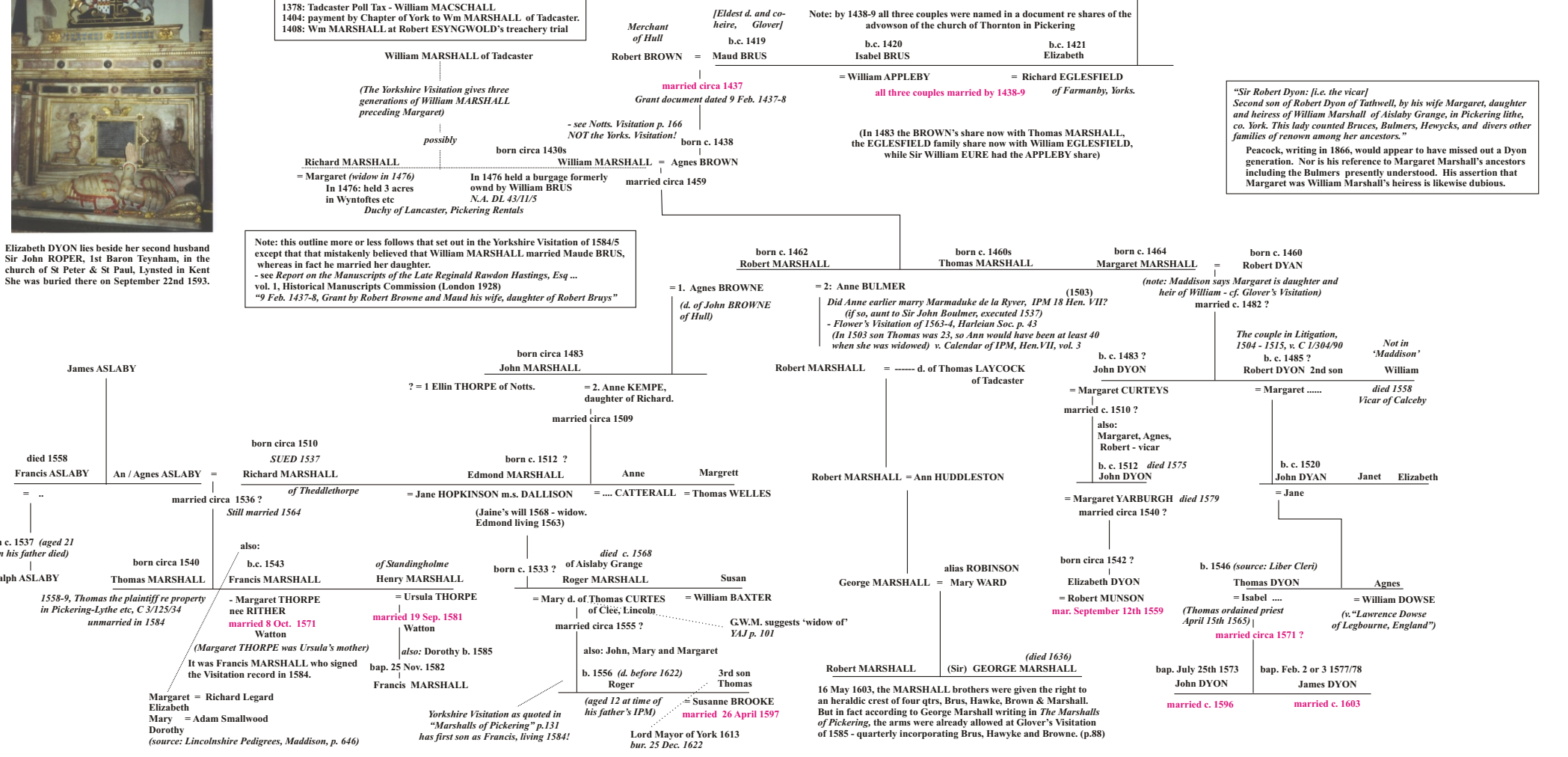
William was the second son, his elder brother Robert having died in 1119. William died in 1212 He married a woman called Beatrice de Teyden, and had by her at least two sons, Robert his successor and William

ca. 1195-1226 married ca. 1219 Isabella, the second daughter of David of Scotland, 8th Earl of Huntingdon - believed to be buried at Guisborough. ca. 1220 - 31 March or 3 May 1295 Robert was Regent of Scotland some time during minority of his 2nd cousin King Alexander III of Scotland Robert de was buried at Guisborough.

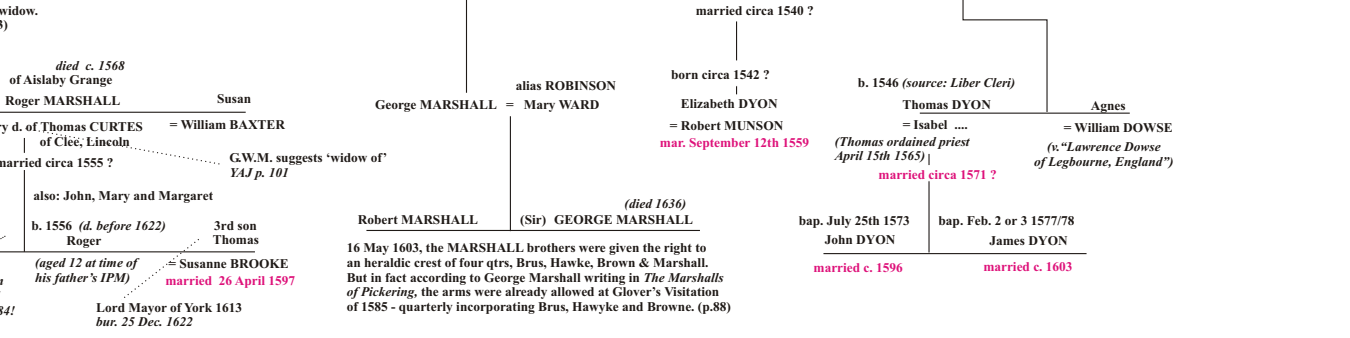
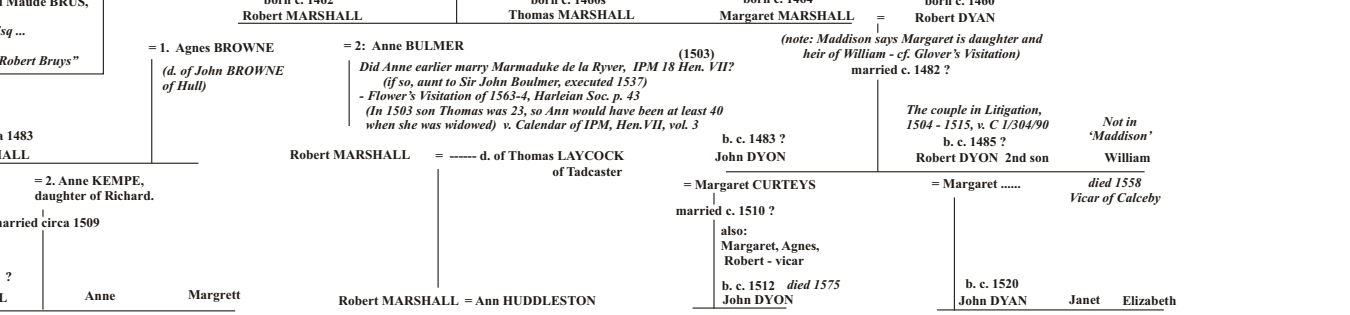
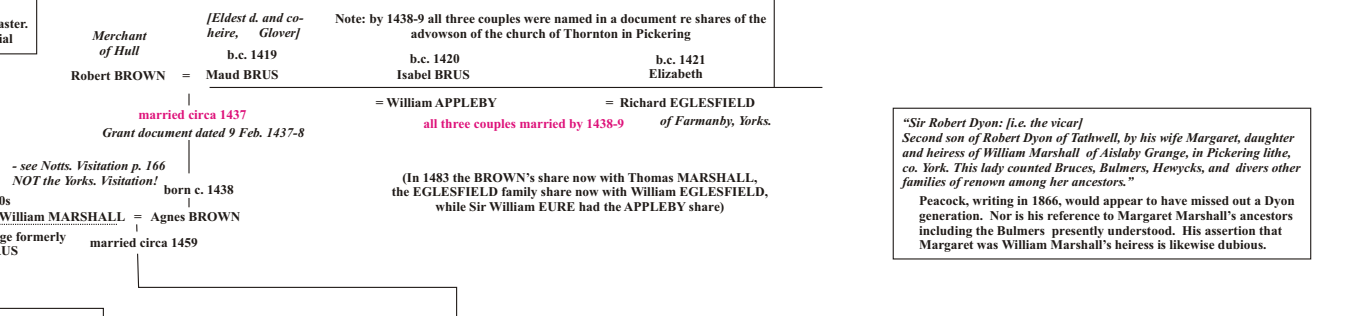
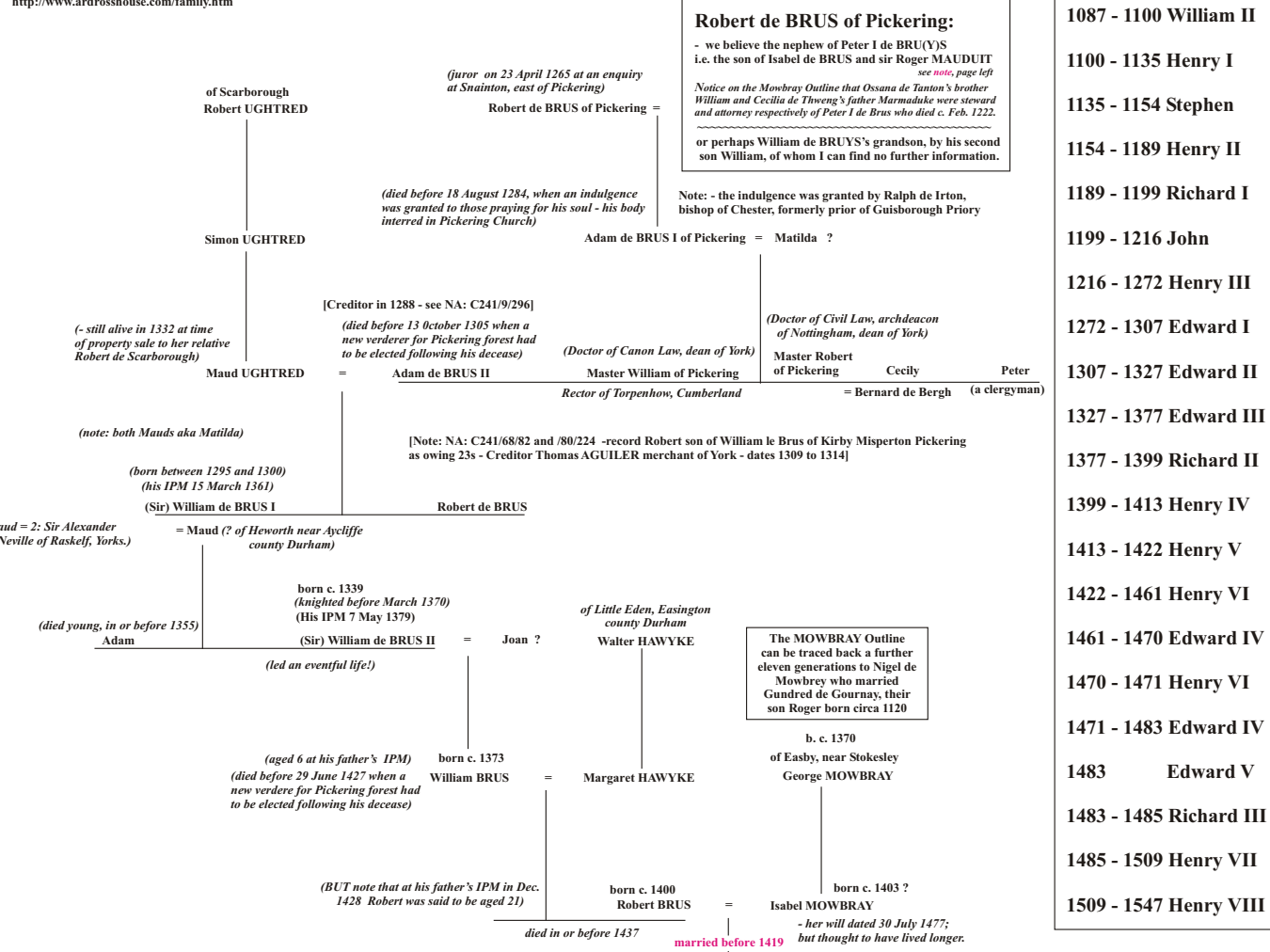
Earl of Carrick in the right of his wife Marjorie, the young widowed heiress of Niall, 2nd Earl of Carrick. Robert died 1304

Robert de BRUS of Pickering: - we believe the nephew of Peter I de BRU(Y)S i.e. the son of Isabel de BRUS and sir Roger MAUDUIT

Note: - the indulgence was granted by Ralph de Irton, bishop of Chester, formerly prior of Guisborough Priory

The MOWBRAY Outline can be traced back a further eleven generations to Nigel de Mowbray who married Gundred de Gourmay, their son Roger born circa 1120

"Sir Robert Dyon: [i.e. the vicar] Second son of Robert Dyon of Tathwell, by his wife Margaret, daughter and heiress of William Marshall of Aislaby Grange, in Pickering lithe, co. York. This lady counted Bruses, Bulmers, Hewycks, and divers other families of renown among her ancestors."

Note: this outline more or less follows that set out in the Yorkshire Visitation of 1584/5 except that that mistakenly believed that William MARSHALL married Maude BRUS, whereas in fact he married her daughter. - see Report on the Manuscripts of the Late Reginald Rawdon Hastings, Esq ... vol. 1, Historical Manuscripts Commission (London 1928) "9 Feb. 1437-8, Grant by Robert Browne and Maud his wife, daughter of Robert Bruys"

Note: by 1438-9 all three couples were named in a document re shares of the advowson of the church of Thornton in Pickering

(In 1483 the BROWN's share now with Thomas MARSHALL, the EGLESFIELD family share now with William EGLESFIELD, while Sir William EURE had the APPLEBY share)

The couple in Litigation, 1504 - 1515, v. C 1/304/90 b. c. 1485 ? Robert DYON 2nd son

16 May 1603, the MARSHALL brothers were given the right to an heraldic crest of four qtrs. Brus, Hawke, Brown & Marshall. But in fact according to George Marshall writing in The Marshalls of Pickering, the arms were already allowed at Glover's Visitation of 1585 - quarterly incorporating Brus, Hawyke and Browne. (p.88)

Yorkshire Visitation as quoted in "Marshalls of Pickering" p.131 has first son as Francis, living 1584!
